This year 25 outstanding student-leaders were selected to participate in the program.

Thankful for the College Experience, Thankful for Scholarships


The first few months of college have felt like a roller coaster ride. During these months, I have cried about being homesick, having hard classes, and struggling to love Spelman. I have done terrible on tests that I actually studied hard for and have struggled to understand concepts discussed in class. I have also had moments

when I simply just wanted to give up and questioned if I made the right decision.

Spelman is extremely expensive and I don't have time, money, or approval from family to stay at an institution that I'm not excelling at. After a getting down a routine, class work has become easier to understand and I have made improvements on tests. My favorite course is my required African Diaspora class because we are learning African American history that I never knew existed. We read works by black authors and discuss topics such as treatment of slaves in Saint Domingue, Africans coming to the Americas before Columbus, the psychological consequences of slave owners denuding slaves, and the argument of race being a social construct.

During my time at Spelman I have also created amazing memories, I met Spike Lee, attended a free Atlanta Dream WNBA game, experienced my first HBCU homecoming, attended Afropunk to see Solange, and met Yvonne Orji at Afropunk.

After the first three weeks of school, I managed to meet a group of friends that I can genuinely relate to and love hanging out with. My little community of friends share the same interests as me and were also extremely homesick so it helped knowing that I wasn't alone.



My ZKL scholarship was the largest scholarship I received and it helped pay for a tremendous amount of my Spelman fees. In order to register for my second semester classes, my \$25,000 balance must be paid in full. I wouldn't be at Spelman College if it weren't for all the local scholarships I received from Iowa organizations.



I refuse to take my Spelman experience for granted because I worked so hard to receive scholarships simply so that I could be here. I will forever be grateful to the Zeta Kappa Lambda scholarship foundation because the foundation gave me the opportunity to attend my dream institution.

In the future, I hope to have the ability to donate to the ZKL scholarship foundation and other great foundations, in order to help high school seniors attend their dream institutions too. In the next few years, I know that I will have to work extremely hard to receive good grades in my college courses. The grades I receive now will determine if I can apply to the Spelman Honors program, and if I can continue to apply for and win scholarships to fund my education at Spelman College.

During summer break, I plan to intern and prepare for my sophomore year of college. In the next few years, I hope to have a clear understanding of what I want to do after Spelman. I plan to figure this out by taking new courses, finding internships, joining clubs, and job shadowing during breaks. Julian Neely is currently a Junior at Iowa State University and he is the Chapter President of the Omicron Pi Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha.

He has been an excellent example of service and advocacy for the Ames community and on the campus of Iowa State University through his deep involvement in various organizations.

Brother Neely is the Assistant District Director for Alpha Phi Alpha – Iowa District, Director of Diversity and Inclusion for the Government Student Body, Community Advisor for his apartment building, and a Freshman Action Team Delegate for the Black Student Alliance. This brother is involved and helping to bring about change he is passionate about and change others need advocacy for.

A few of the projects and initiatives he is working closely with include: the pursuit of divine nine plots on the campus of Iowa State University, cultural competency training for professors and staff, and a Tree of Oppression awareness initiative.

Although the proposal for the divine nine plots is still in its evaluation stage, there has been a good amount of support and excitement for this project. This would be the first project of its kind on campus and would further solidify the presence and relevancy of Black Greek Letter Organizations on campus.

Students have expressed the desire to have a more connected classroom. The connection mentioned here is a call for closer alignment and acceptance of each student's culture and needs to provide a more inclusive environment. Brother Neely is working on initiatives to help build support to have staff training include awareness of language, culture, backgrounds, orientation, accessibility, communication tools, etc.

Brother Neely is also involved in the process of planning the Tree of Oppression initiative this Fall. This will be a project where chains of several different colors will be placed around a tree to represent different identities. Participating students select and define the meaning of the link they choose to place on the tree. Each color can mean something different and will be unique to the individual. This symbolizes that even though one link can look like another, it may be associated with a radically different story. Students will add a link to the tree and then add / define their identity on posters.

The intent of the Tree of Oppression initiative is to start conversations and raise the comfort levels when it comes time to break the silence or topics of oppression. Brother Neely and his committee are in the process of working through a call of action plan for this initiative.





This brother's passion comes from personal experiences that sparked a burning desire to change situations and help others avoid negative experiences. He is fueled by encouraging, protecting, and acting on behalf of others. "We all have a voice," he said, "and we should seek to do something with it." Conversation only goes so far, and recognition is irrelevant. Brother Neely is a brother of action and he works diligently to see action in his communities.
